Appendix 4c Monthly for November 2024 - Revised

Papyrus Australia Ltd (“Papyrus”) announcement relation to the Appendix 4c monthly for November 2024 included the following amounts under current month: -

Item 1 – Cash flow from operating activities

- Under 1.2 (a) payments for Research & Development \$346,000 (this related to R&D activities carried out by PPYEg on behalf of the Company, and payment of these services was via the reduction of the intercompany loan.)
- Under 1.2 (f) payments for Administration & Corporate \$86,000 (this number included \$50,000 relating to legal fees associated with the Summons received by PPY and the matter is closed so no further costs will be incurred)

Item 8 – Estimate cash available for future operating activities

- The two amounts referred to above, distort the calculation in **item 8.5** which in the Companies view is designed to reflect the period of time remaining before current available funds are exhausted based on normal operating activities. Hence, as these amounts are highly unlikely to reoccur, they were treated as abnormal items for the purposes of calculating **8.5**, in order to not mislead the market relating to the Company been able to fund its future operating activities.

This approach was incorrect and the attached Appendix 4C is the corrected announcement

Drawdowns at the board's discretion can be request in tranches of \$50k.</p> <p>Interest is only payable on any drawdown amounts and is calculated by applying the NAB "Usaver savings account or, the 12 months term deposit rates" (whichever is the greater plus a 1% margin.</p> <p>Currently no drawdowns have been made.</p> <p>The Company has an arrangement with Radium Capital to advance loans based on the R&D undertaken. The process for drawdowns requires the company to make an application to Radium Capital which is supported by expenditure incurred. The repayment of the loan drawdowns is repaid following the submission of the Company tax return at year end. Answer: No.

Included in the Current Month total outflow amount of \$455,000 were two items considered to be abnormal on the basis that they won't reoccur in future reporting periods., namely: -

- \$346,000 for R&D Activities carried out by PPYEg on behalf of Papyrus Australia Ltd ("PPY)". Payment for these services was via the reduction of the inter-company loan. Note that the inter-company loan relates to funds previously transferred by The Company to PPYEg to support its operating activities
- \$50,000 in legal fees associated with the Summons received by PPY. This matter is now closed and no further expenditure is expected.
- The two amounts referred to above, distort the calculation in item 8.5 which in the Companies view is designed to reflect the period of time remaining before current available funds are exhausted based on normal operating activities. Hence, as these amounts are highly unlikely to reoccur, they were treated as abnormal items for the purposes of calculating 8.5 above, in order to not mislead the market relating to the Company been able to fund its future operating activities.

8.6.2 Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

Answer: Yes

The company continually reviews its funding options to ensure that it raises sufficient cash to maintain its operating activities. And based on the success of past capital raising activities expects that any future capital raising activities will be successful.

8.6.3 Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Answer: Yes.

Based on the success of previous capital raisings, the implementation of the previously announced Vietnam initiative (ASX announcement 30 October 2024) and the related capital raising which is being managed by L39 (ASX Announcement 26 November 2024), and the distribution of dividends from the PPYEg which has commenced the commercialising and is expected to be profitable by second quarter of 2026

NOTE: The information provided in this Appendix 4c does not include financial information of Papyrus Egypt, as Papyrus Australia does not currently control Papyrus Egypt even though it has a direct equity interest of 50% and an indirect equity interest of 19.61% (through its 39.22% equity interest in the joint venture partner EBFC (Egyptian Banana Fibre Company))

The activities of Papyrus Egypt are currently accounted for in the half year report and annual report using the equity accounting method.
